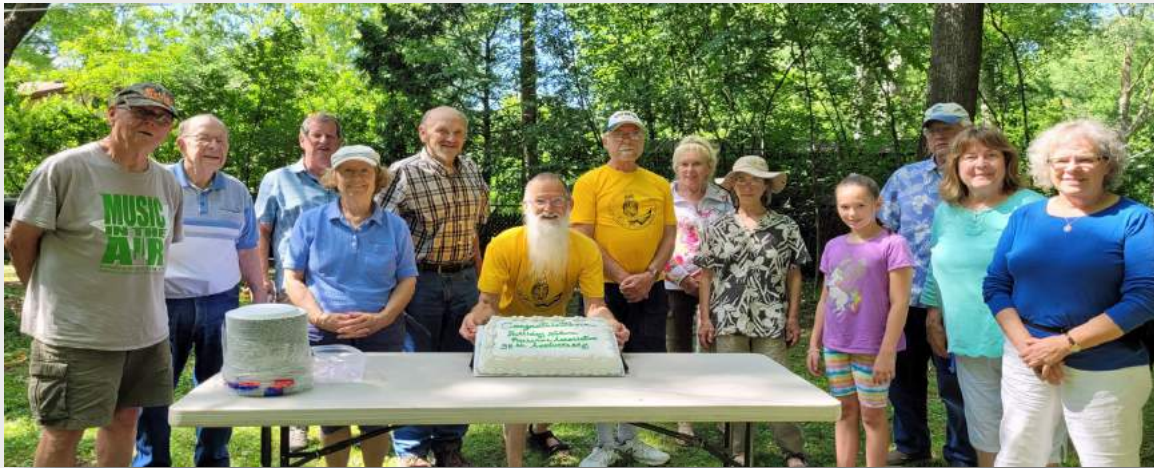




HNPA Hosts 35th Anniversary Celebration

Rouge Rescue on the Tonquish

On Saturday, April 13 HNPA continued our "Rouge Rescue" tradition, this time on Tonquish Creek downstream of Hix. We enjoyed a very mild, sunny mosquito-free morning that was conducive to getting trash out of the creek and taking a heavy load of floating wood and debris out of a log jam.

Volunteers, all who have been part of this process in the past, work like a well-oiled machine. The wood is cut up and handed to a crew on land to pile on the floodplain. This work improves the flow, aerates the water for the fish and cuts down on flooding upstream.

We also had a crew cutting honeysuckle, buckthorn and

bittersweet vines that choke out native plants.

Saturday, Oct. 7, 10 a.m.—1 p.m. Koppernick Section, Koppernick Road, south of Joy Road, west of Hix Road. Refreshing walk in tall trees, then some work in Swallow wort problem area. Gloves and loppers provided. Removing seed pods helps control spread. Come for the walk, the work, or both!

◆ Another Fall Color Walk and Work

Saturday, Oct. 14, 10 a.m.—1 p.m. Newburgh entrance, east of Newburgh Road, just north of Warren Road. Enjoy changing colors, then help with some work in field area. Gloves and loppers provided. Come for the walk, the work, or both!

◆ Yet Another Fall Color Walk and Work

Saturday, Oct. 21 10 a.m.—1 p.m. Cowan entrance, Central City Parkway, west of Wayne Road. North of Warren Road. Leaves falling, cooler temperatures for walk along Tonquish Creek, then some more honeysuckle cutting and piling at entrance. Gloves and loppers provided. Come for the walk, the work, or both!

◆ Late Fall Walk – BUT NO Work

Saturday, Nov. 4, 10 -11:30 a.m. Ellsworth entrance, parking at Nankin Mills, on Hines Drive, east of Ann Arbor Trail. Crunching leaves on this loop trail across the floodplain.

◆ Early Winter Walk

Saturday, Dec. 9, 10 a.m.—11:30 a.m. Cowan entrance, Central City Parkway, west of Wayne Road, north of Warren Road. Some calming “forest bathing” before holiday shopping.

Detroit Audubon Society Bird Walk

On May 21, Jack Smiley, a past president of Detroit Audubon Society, led a rather long parade of 22 excited birders through the Koppernick section. It was difficult to get good photos, since birds were high in treetops or in shade. A few highlights were seen, including male and female Scarlet Tanagers, Wood Pewee catching insects and the loud drumming of a Pileated Woodpecker. It was a very successful walk.

A Look Back at our Spring Events

April 15 - A slow walk in the Newburgh section through field area, then on boardwalks through forest, going into open area of capped Nankin dumpsite.

We pointed out a number of Spring wildflowers and saw a garter snake recently out of hibernation, who stuck its tongue out to us, or perhaps for us.



April 19 - Volunteers removed illegal camp debris from Newburgh floodplain. (See before and after photos.)



April 22 - Volunteers came back to Newburgh section to continue cutting down invasive plants. We must cut vines before they overwhelm trees.

Three hours of hard work using loppers, hand pruners and saws cleared a wide area around several trees. Thank you, volunteers!



Vernal Pool Patrol Program



On April 29, a team of instructors from Michigan Natural Features

Inventory held a field training session for the Vernal Pool Patrol program, in the Koppernick section. HNPCA president Bill assisted and joined the program.

The Preserve certainly has vernal pools, but currently, they are only identified as

“potential” vernal pools. Our pools need to be properly surveyed to provide adequate data for proper verification.

The training went well. Bill came back later to start surveying pools.

Parks Secures Grant for Preserve

For several years Wayne County Parks has been seeking grants to improve the park system, including Holliday Nature Preserve.

For even longer, HNPCA has communicated our interest in helping to determine how best Holliday Preserve could be improved. To reinforce our interest, the HNPCA Board agreed that President Bill Craig would be authorized to begin discussing issues with Wayne County Commissioners.

Bill had meeting with Commissioner Glenn Anderson on March 17, with a walk in the Cowan section on June 20.

The commissioner saw one of the unsafe bridges,

looked at Morgan Creek conditions and walked the old (1960s) roadbed.

That same day Bill got email from WCP Director Alicia Bradford that Parks received \$10 million from American Rescue Plan Act, for three projects, one being Holliday Preserve.

Bill already had a meeting with Commissioner Terry Marecki, on May 8, asking about a possible grant. With the grant already approved, Bill took Commissioner Marecki for a walk in the Cowan section to show her the very same things Commissioner Anderson saw.

At a meeting on Aug. 7, a Canton resident near the Preserve asked Commis-



sioner Melissa Daub about plans for the Preserve. Commissioner Daub replied that nothing has been finalized and that plans will be shared once conceptual drafts are complete. She added that a meeting will be scheduled that will include Commissioners and Bill Craig of the HNPCA.

We look forward to seeing a conceptual draft.
