We were created when a threat to the Preserve (a proposal to turn part of it into a golf course) arose in 1988. Thanks to the people who formed or joined our then fledging organization that threat was defeated. Afterwards, members decided that the Preserve needed an advocate, so we took on that role. It's one we continue to play today, although we've broadened our purpose throughout the decades to include education, walks, clean-ups and more.

We have survived because of our members—past and present. In fact, some of them present at the first meeting are still active today!. We are grateful to them and to all of you who continue to support us with your

**Bill's Address:** 20050 Milburn, Livonia (north of 7 Mile and East of Merriman). Call 248-476-5127 for more information.


## **Membership Meeting**

First, thanks to all who came to the Feb. 18
Membership meeting. We discussed the past, present and future of HNPA and Holliday Nature Preserve. We also accepted more nominations for Board positions and elected its members.

Thanks to generous members our treasury remains solid. We discussed the need to better define dues, donations and Life Membership practices. At present, we will keep dues at \$5! We also discussed the possibility of moving to a digital newsletter because of increased printing, mailing and postage costs, which cannot be covered by dues alone. We have a committee looking at ways to better communicate electronically with members who WANT that option. Examples would offering a digital newsletter option and creating an electronic newsletter for more frequent communications. Both are only ideas and we welcome your thoughts. (Note:there is a space for your email address on the application should you wish to provide one.)

We find much good in the plan and were happy to see that Holliday Nature Preserve is mentioned several times.

However, we have a major concern about a PLANNED \$5 million project that is based on new bridges and trails. While we support trails, it has long been HNPA's position that keeping the Preserve sectional in nature (as it currently exists), is a better option for the Preserve, users and for taxpayers. We hope to convince Parks to revise this project. Doing so would reduce the need for major bridge construction; substantially reduce construction costs and future maintenance costs. Building something is wonderful, but so is

having the funds and personnel to maintain it, as anyone who sees the condition of Holliday's present bridges can attest.

We ask that you review the Plan and contact us should you have questions. If you agree with our position, please share your concern with your County Commissioner and Wayne County Parks. HNPA will also work on sharing our concerns with general public.

We closed the meeting with an old fashioned slide show of very old HNP slides. Part of this slide show covered the various bridges, pointing out which ones were essential and those not really needed.

Members left knowing actions were being taken to sustain HNPA into the future.

## **Board of Directors is Elected**

over the last 35 years, HNPA has kept a close eye on the Holliday Nature Preserve and on the donations you sent our way to ensure money was spent wisely and for the reasons you trusted us with it. However, we have a confession to make: We didn't keep a close eye on our bylaws, elections and Board of Directors.

Back in 2018 we started taking the first steps to correct this situation. We began to have regular membership meetings and began the practice of seeking new people to replace incumbents or fill vacancies. Generally, there were few takers and current officers were

simply re-elected. Same in 2019.

In 2020 we asked for people to be on Board. Nomination were taken, then COVID interrupted the process.

Last October we had our first face-to-face membership meeting in two years. Some people accepted nominations and were elected to Board. That was a major first step. This new Board's first focus was updating and revising the Bylaws, to reflect our current practices.

We started 2023 with a Board of Directors meeting on Feb. 4, which was quickly followed by a membership meeting Feb. 18 (see article elsewhere in this issue). More nominations were made to fill vacancies on the evolving Board and more people were elected. The process seems somewhat unusual, but that is the reality as we get things in order for the future.

There was another Board meeting on March 11, where the fifth revision draft of the bylaws was debated. We're close to having them completed and voted on. Also, at that meeting, the important step of getting officers elected was accomplished. HNPA has a new Board of Directors—finally. Their names and roles appear below.
