couple of years ago, the very invasive vine –
Black Swallow-wort –
made its appearance in
Koppernick section of the
Preserve. It was initially spotted on the Beech
Trail, near the restroom floor ruins. We did have a work day identifying those vines and removing



them.

seed
pods

had already opened. This resulted in the affected area expanding.

In September, an effort was made to pick off seed pods before any released. However, it's likely some pods were overlooked.

It would be very helpful if members took some time to just look for seed pods, bag them and then burn them at home.
