> "Footprints in the Snow" Walk

Sat., Jan. 29, Noon. Cowan Section. Parking at Cowan entrance, Central City Parkway, west of Wayne Road, north of Warren Road.

We will look for signs of winter life along the trail including bird and animal tracks. Boots are recommended since there may be slippery spots.

"Is Winter Over Yet?" Walk

Sat., Feb. 19, Noon. Koppernick Section. Koppernick Road, south of Joy Road, west of Hix Road.

A slow and easy walk on one of the main loop trails. One of the nicest areas to enjoy Winter (while we still can).

"Last Day of Winter" Walk

Sat., Mar. 19, Noon. Ellsworth Section. Parking at Nankin Mills, on Hines Drive, east of Ann Arbor Trail.

Yes, Spring IS the next day. Trail is often muddy and can be slippery as we cross the floodplain. However, spotting some early wildflowers will make the trek well worthwhile!

Fall Hikes & Fall Fixes



Oct 23: While Bill Craig was isolating due to Covid exposure, Sue, along with some of the regular walkers, went anyway enjoying a beautiful, early Fall day in Cowan.



Nov 20: During this walk in the Koppernick Section, Bill took the group along a side trail into Westland's Hix Park that adjoins it. This was an opportunity to outline some differences between the Preserve and the Park.



Dec 18: Several hard rains made the floodplain wet and slippery, while high winds scattered tree limbs across the trail. These things turned a simple walk into more of an obstacle course.



Preserve walker reported big trees down across Cowan trail. HNPA chainsaw was put to good use opening the trail for passage so walkers did not need to cut additional trails.

In another section, Phil Crookshank (a.k.a. "Mr. Winch,") and a team of hardy helpers, tackled a huge cottonwood that fell across a trail opening that trail, as well.





A Preserve walker reported an abandoned campsite in the Koppernick Section.
The tent and all materials were removed by HNPA volunteers and hauled to the entrance where Wayne County Parks hauled it away.



In Cowan section, a teepee made of big logs was taken apart and scattered. While harmless, allowing items like this to remain can give the impression that hunters are using the Preserve or that unnatural structures are allowed/encouraged.

Preserve Buck Killed By Arrow

n our Dec. 18 walk in Ellsworth, a dead buck was spotted in the floodplain. The next day Bill Craig examined the remains.

A Ravin 2 blade mechanical broadhead crossbow arrow was found imbed-

ded in its hind quarter.
We cannot say where the
deer was shot but in
Westland or Livonia,
hunting is illegal.

This was NOT a good kill. This was not even hunting, and certainly not by a true sportsman. Death came slowly.

The remains will be consumed. The bones and antlers will be chewed by animals in Preserve. However, the so-called hunter with the crossbow walks free.
